Faculty of Law

The Chuo Law Faculty dates back 134 years to the origins of Chuo University as the Igrisu Horitsu Gakko (English Law School), and over the years has produced many talented graduates who have served in the fields of law, government, politics and business. While maintaining its longstanding traditions, the Law Faculty remains committed to the needs of university education and serving our ever-changing society.

The Faculty of Law offers more than 280 seminars, as well as numerous classes taught by prominent real-world professionals working in various fields. In addition, the curriculum guides students to cultivate the abilities they will need to enter the Graduate School of Law, or numerous other legal and non-legal career paths.

Faculty of Economic

The Faculty of Economics emphasizes practical education to develop the basic skills and specialized knowledge needed to become a working member of society. Specifically, the systematic curriculum aims to foster skills that students will need in our global society, based on three pillars: seminars, career education, and global human resource development.

For human resource development, the Global Leaders Program nurtures individuals who can succeed on the world stage. Collaborating with Hakumon-kai branches worldwide, the Faculty also provides overseas internships organized by alumni. Graduates enter a wide variety of industries in the professional world and, remarkably, about ten percent become civil servants.

Faculty of Commerce

In 2019, the Faculty of Commerce revised its curriculum and made changes in programs to establish new courses, including internships in sports businesses and overseas companies, and Project-Based Learning classes that enable students to undertake the development of products and services aimed at community problem solving. The study environment helps students to learn practical skills directly linked to career

qualifications, such as CPA, financial planner and securities analyst, and produces a large number of successful CPA Exam candidates each year, boasting one of Japan's highest pass rates for the CPA exam. In 2018, 55 students (including graduates) passed the exam and went on to obtain desirable positions at major auditing firms and corporate accounting departments across Japan.

Faculty of Science and Engineering

The Faculty of Science and Engineering emphasizes fostering individuals with solid basic knowledge and applicable skills in the specialized fields of each department, and equips them with the abilities for diversified needs, including negotiation to integrate organizations and competence to deal with the challenges presented in new issues, as well as the ability to play an active role in global society. In 2019, the Faculty will

celebrate the 70th anniversary of its establishment. With "Education through Research Experience" as a main focus of its educational philosophy, the Faculty will further enhance educational and research activities in order to cultivate individuals able to address the challenges that continue to arise in human society.

Faculties

Faculty of Letters

Humans and humanity are at the core of studies in the Faculty of Letters. The Faculty aims to cultivate students with specialized knowledge and broad learning in liberal arts, as well as the ability to think deeply and gain a thorough understanding of diverse subjects. With 13 departments, including literature, culture, foreign language studies, history, philosophy, sociology, pedagogy, psychology, and other fields,

students can choose their own combination of courses from among more than 700 offerings, including those from Chuo's other faculties. Priority is placed on small class size throughout the faculty, educational programs are calibrated to meet diverse academic needs, and faculty members are on-call for students to consult at the common office in each department.

Faculty of Policy Studies

With four fields of focus – policy, culture, foreign languages, and information, students are first given a firm foundation in liberal arts, preparing each individual to study extensively in fields of their own interest. In addition to English classes, 9 other languages (including Malay/Indonesian, Hindi/Urdu, and Persian) are taught in small classes. The GATE Program is conducted in English and other languages, offering learning

in specialized fields, and information education supports students to pass the national IT Passport Examination. With distinctive curricula and appealing seminars in various fields, the Faculty also supports students' off-campus activities, helping individuals to discover and solve problems, and to analyze social phenomena in Japan and overseas from various perspectives.

Faculty of Global Management

The curriculum in the Faculty of Global Management is characterized by a learning structure aimed at developing global awareness and the systematic acquisition of expertise on management and economics. Seventy percent of classes are taught in foreign languages (mainly English), an approach that is aimed at developing systematic learning and fluency in

foreign languages. The Faculty also aims to build meaningful reciprocal relationships with actors in global business situations in order to encourage mutual economic growth and social development and to produce individuals with the power and capabilities to realize a globally inclusive society.

Faculty of Global Informatics

Information Systems, Information with Law, and Global Liberal Arts are the focus of learning in the Faculty of Global Informatics. In the rapidly changing world of information technology, laws and regulations have not caught up with developments in information communication technology. In order to solve problems in such a society, we need to have knowledge of information systems (information technology) and knowledge of laws and regulations in the information field. Focusing on the integration of Information Systems and

Information with Law, the Faculty offers specialized education necessary for tomorrow's information society. Furthermore, in order to play an active role in global society, students are required to have knowledge and skills obtained through specialized education, and English ability and cross-cultural understanding to collaborate with others based on global liberal arts, such as philosophy, ethics and religion. In short, the Faculty regards Information systems, information with law, and global liberal arts as pillars of learning.
